Ceramic Sculpture in Post-War American Art

By Sequoia Miller, Doctoral Candidate, Yale University

On Monday, December 12, Sequoia Miller, Ph. D. candidate in the history of Art at Yale University, and previous recipient of a CCSC grant, will discuss ceramic sculpture in post-war American art. The 1950s, 60s, and 70s saw explosive growth in approaches to clay as an artistic medium in the United States. Using the recent exhibition The Ceramic Presence in Modern Art as a jumping off point, this lecture will consider interactions between artists using clay, including Peter Voulkos, Ken Price, and Robert Arneson, and artists working with other media to explore the role of ceramics in post-World War II American art.

Sequoia Miller is a doctoral candidate at Yale University and curator of The Ceramic Presence in Modern Art at the Yale University Art Gallery. Before coming to Yale, he was a full-time studio potter.
